PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Residents of Indian Lake:

Summer is here, and I'm sure everyone is looking forward to enjoying our lake. Our lake and community are in good and improving condition.

A lot of fresh sand has been put on North Beach along with several other improvements. The North Beach clean-up last: month was one of the best ever, thanks to the help of everyone who participated. The dam is getting some much needed improvements, and fishing is steadily improving. Incidently, at least two pair of Canadian geese nested at the east end of the lake this summer.

We have arranged a new contract for security patrol this summer with Officers Jessee Kennedy and Bob Jones of the Lawrence Police Department. They have been instructed to strictly enforce our lake use regulations. Non-residents will be removed from lake property unless accompanied by a resident. In addition, any cars parked on lake property without an Indian Lake decal will be removed. If you need decals, please contact a board member. Outside usage of our lake is increasing, and strict enforcement of our regulations is the only way in which we can keep this potential problem under control.

Should you encounter a situation in which security is needed, please contact a board member. The board member will contact one of the officers. In this way, we can insure a prompt, organized procedure for obtaining "on-call" security assistance.

Along with the Marion County Board of Health, we have been monitoring the water quality of Indian Lake. At this time, we have no conclusive findings to report. A meeting with Mr. Ketterman of the Marion County Board of Health is being planned. A report of our findings will be included in the next newsletter.

As many of you are aware, the Board is concerned with the general appearance of our community. At the request of several lake residents, several unsightly situations have been identified. Through the much appreciated cooperation of our neighbors several of these situations have been corrected. However, there are still some that have not. The Board will continue to encourage lot owners to help keep our Indian Lake environment in top quality.

Our next Board meeting will be Monday evening, June 20, 7:30 pm, at the home of Mrs. French. Please do not hesitate to attend.

as they are full of quite sharp teeth. The carp seem to be coming under control, but please remove any you catch. This will help keep the lake clean and result in better reproduction of game fish.


EVERYTHING IS COMING UP BEAUTIFUL!

.... The sun did shine at times inbetween the heavy rains this spring, and much yardwork, planting and landscaping has been taking place on the grounds of most homes in the Indian Lake area.

As a result of all the hard work, it's becoming mighty pretty in our community!

WE COULD USE MORE SUNSHINE

.... While the rain has contributed to the luxuriant green foliage enhancing our countryside, it also has adversely affected the sycamore and ash trees. Their leaves, wilted and brown



spotted, have been drifting down due to a fungus, Anthracnose, caused by the rain. A garden books suggests that if they are not too tall it may be effective to spray them with copper, dodine, ferbam or maneb; to to prune off infected material. In that most of these trees around here are too tall for other than commercial spraying, a call was made to the Agriculture Extension Agent. Advice follows: Fertilize the trees, keep the leaves raked and disposed of because the spores will winter-over in the ground. Even though the leaves fall, they probably will return if you fertilize and remove fallen leaves.
